Danzig Staatsarch., 358, 374:

Andreas Mierau is mentioned in the history of the
Baerwalde Region. On January 19, 1757, he along with others
purchased the right to live on land in the region.

Danzig Staatsarch., 358, 945:

In 1725, Absalon Mirau owned 2 Hufen 6 Morgen of land.
(Hufe = 80-120 acres, Morgen = 0.6-0.9 acres)

In the year 1776, four possible Mieraus were listed:

Johann Mierau from Neudorf
Michael Mierau from Vorwerk
Peter Mierau from Dragasz
Arend Mieretz (Mierau?) from Schoeneberg

In 1776, Johann Mierau and his wife had a daughter
living in their home. He was a farmer and owned his own
land. One female servant who was working in their home
stayed with the Mierau family. Their economic situation was
rated poor. They had no sons or male servants living at
home. They were living in the village of Neudorf, West
Prussia.

In 1776, Michael Mierau and his wife had five sons and
one daughter living in their home in Vorwerk, West Prussia.
He was a farmer who owned his own land, but his economic
situation was considered poor. He had no servants.

Peter Mierau had and his wife had one son and two
daughters living with them in the village of Dragasz, West
Prussia, in 1776. They also had two female and two male
servants living on their estate. Peter was a farmer and
owner of his estate. Their economic condition, though, was
rated poor.
